




Anvil star passes on lessons of a lifetime

The March 1st meeting was held at Austin's Iron Works. As usual Steve and David went all out as hosts in their fine shop. Steve demonstrated some of his jigs for his trip hammers. The lunch was a sumptuous buffet where we pigged out and the keg of beer livened things up as the day went on. The business meeting primarily covered the May 4-10 workshop at Lost Valley Lake Resort. Jerry Hoffman showed his revised design for entrance screens, which both Lost Valley and Francis Whitaker, who will be master craftsman leading the project, approved. Rich Gentry of Lost Valley Lake Resort has been more than generous in covering expenses and providing accomodations for Francis and BAM. Thank you, from all of us. The members of BAM who plan on working on the project have hopefully all gotten in touch with the workshop screening committee and and will be contacted concerning final details. Unfortunately Francis Whitaker will only be able to direct the first 6 days of the workshop, and will miss the final day, when the entrance screens will be completed. On Saturday night, May 10th, there will be a party celebrating the workshop that all BAM members are invited to attend. A place for BAM members to display and sell their work will be provided. After the meeting the raffle was held for the hammer Grady Holley and Clarissa Gyorgy made, and Bill McDonald was the lucky winner. In our candle holder exchange therewere 7 entries -no two nearly alike - all showing the creativity of our members.

Following this, Manuel Calderon demonstrated acetylene welding of cast iron with cast iron rod and cast iron flux. He then demonstrated dressing a pry bar and showed his methods of hardening and tempering.

Bernie Tappel had a fine damascus knife blade he had made and a billet of damascus was welded by several members.

Steve Austin and I experimented with using his power hammer splitting jig for a 4-way split and twist and a 2-way split and twist. I then demonstrated pipe forging on the trip hammer.

After the meeting a movie showing a blacksmith get-together about 1971 before ABANA with Alex Bealer and a slide show were planned. The movie projector jammed and only the slide show was seen at the meeting.

After the meeting a chili supper at Steve Austin and Terri DiGiusto's house was held and a working projector was obtained and the movie shown.


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

The Hoodiess Forge

If you are tired of working in smoky conditions and/or tired of struggling with a hood when forging large, cumbersone shapes, the hoodless forge may be just the thing for you. Bob Bourdon says that he learned how to proportion this sort of forge nearly fifty years ago when he was a lad helping our George Charon, then the village smith of Woodstock, Vermont, Mr. Charon's forge drew as clean as a whistle, and so does Bob's.

Using this forge is a pleasure! Besides having practically forgotten what coal smoke smells like, I find that every couple of months, I remove at least a heaping scoop shove!'s worth of very fine coal dust from the bottom of the smoke chamber. This is the dust that normally blows into the air with a hooded forge—the dust that settles on every horizontal surface in the forge, into every follicle in your mose and beyond into your own set of bellows. I, furthermore, find that having the tuyere next to the orifice has been anything but a disadvantage. I have built a 20 x 12 foot gateway using this force and found it remarkably versatile in dealing with large forms — especially with the aid of an overhead crane that is easy to use with no hood to get in the way.

With this sort of arrangement, I have found it not difficult to heat scroll-like forms that were over six feet in width, to forge 12 foot sections of 1 Vi hich bar into arch forms, to heat one foot wide sections of 3/16 inch plate without smoking up the shop, to linseed oil finish large pieces without a puff of acrid smoke, and to take a welding heat on a 20 inch diameter hoop of w x 1 inch stock set vertically into the fire and find that the smoke and flames shoot so horizontally into the orifice, that the top of the hoop can be grasped with a bare hand.
