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


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

Editor's anvil

Haven't been able to make many meetings lately, my boys have basketball games every weekend and around here parents work the games. If anyone has mastered the art of being in two places at once let me know how you do it.

I have managed some forge time, enough so that my coal supply is just about gone. Got to follow the map on page 6 and get me some more. Joe tells me there may be some other locations coming especially in the Kansas City area.

There's a lot happening in the coming months, check the News section for details on a beginner's workshop, a knife workshop and the annual demo at Lincoln's New Salem, this year featuring brother Pat.

Tom was quite outspoken at the last business meeting on the subject of selling coal to non-members of BAM. He did the right thing and followed up with a letter explaining his feelings. We will take this matter up again at the next meeting. Tom makes some valid points. There are also some good points on the other side of the issue. Let's all take a good look at both sides and reach a good consensus in March.

I will point out one more thing in favor of Tom's argument. This month I

ordered some seeds from the Seed Savers Exchange, a group based in Iowa that keeps alive the world's supply of open-pollinated (as opposed to hybrid) seeds. That group lives on membership dues but has recently made its catalog available to non-members like me. Thye include a form for joining with the order form but membership isn't required to get seeds. Maybe we should set the price for the coal so that it would be a wash to join and encourage (but not require) membership. Best of both world's? Maybe.

Dear BAM,

t 4 am Saturday morning Jan.
19 I awoke anticipating a 5
o'clock departure for the BAM
meeting only to find a heavy layer of
snow and more falling. This provided
me with an hour and a half more Zs
waiting for daylight so I could plow
our driveway and hill. By daylight it
had quit snowing and there was 5
inches of heavy snow to deal with.

I finished loading my truck and started the 3-1/2 hour drive to Salisbury, Mo., anticipating meeting our new area blacksmiths Japheth Howard and Alice James. I was also anxious to make this meeting because my travels to other blacksmith conferences have caused me to miss a couple of BAM meetings. I also had 4,000 pounds of scrap iron in the form of a 40-pound Bradley beam hammer for Phil Cox that I wanted to get off my truck and onto his. I arrived in time to see people having dessert. While they were finishing their meal I had a tour of the shop which was well equipped.

The business meeting that followed lunch provided an unpleasant experience for me. When I heard it stated that it was BAM's new policy to sell coal only to members of BAM, it brought back memories of the distant past and the story of one old Missouri

blacksmith who was told he could not get coal unless he belonged to BAM. From that point on the word BAM was not allowed in his shop. There was an elderly man who came to this meeting with the intention of joining BAM and buying some coal because he thought he would be interested in blacksmithing. Hearing this discussion, he left the building stating he had no desire to be part of this organization.

There was once an ample supply of coal in all communities in Missouri. But since the demise of blacksm-smithing that supply line has dried up. Over the years BAM has put together a program for purchasing coal, making it available to the membership for one price and a small premium for people who are not members.

Our new policy that would not allow us to make this material available to non-members defies one of the principles which has helped to bring blacksmithing back to our society both as a hobby and a profession.

In my opinion, there are several reasons why this is bad policy. First, if a person buys 10 bags of coal at a \$2 premium, that equals a year's membership. Second, there are several hundred farriers in Missouri who have the occasional need for coal. Three, there are people who simply do not like to belong to organizations. All of the above and maybe more are reasons why we should share our good fortunes with others.


I made a motion that we sell coal to non-members for \$2 a bag extra. This motion was seconded and good discussion followed, which resulted in the motion being tabled for further investigation of our present policies of selling coal. If we are not careful, this will stir up a big bucket of worms, bringing attention to matters that we would rather not air publicly.

I would encourage the management of BAM to withdraw the new policy and let's share our knowledge and good fortunes with any and every one wishing to participate in any level of blacksmithing.




Details of the meeting are sketchy as most of the old reliable note takers couldn't make the meeting including our secretary John Murray so we don't have any meeting minutes.

At the business meeting the coal situation was debated at length, including whether BAM should sell coal to non-members or not. That issue was tabled to let the membership give it some more thought. Also








ABANA Chapter Liaison Letter

he change in chapter affiliation (Article III-A), as addressed in the minutes of the November ABANA Board meeting posted on the website at: http://abana.org/downloads/board meeting seattle.pdf requires a change in the ABANA bylaws, thus a vote of the ABANA membership (Article XI). The bylaws are being revised to address changes in the Georgia laws of incorporation and address areas to reflect how we as an organization do business now. Once the changes are made, the revised bylaws will be mailed to all ABANA members for a vote to accept the revised bylaws. After that vote has been recorded and verified, the changes will be official, including the change in chapter status. We anticipate this process to be completed by the end of April. Until that time the chapter status remains as it is now.



Changes may be required in individual chapter bylaws to address this change in rela-




Besides the demo the event will feature a gallery of work by those attending, so bring a piece to display. Also bring your tools for tailgating.

From St. Louis drive east on I-64 to Nashville, Ill. Go south to Hwy. 127 to Murphysboro. When you pass under the train trestle north of town prepare to turn right at the stop light at the intersection with Industrial Dr.

From SE Missouri cross the Mississippi at Cape and drive north on Hwy. 3 and from central Mo. cross at Chester, Ill. and go south on Hwy. 3. Turn west on Hwy 149 and drive 11 miles to Murphysboro. Pass through the downtown area. (If you look left, between 13th and 12th streets, you will see the bronze fountain he made.) Pass the courthouse on left and drive .5 miles, turn left on Hwy 127-13. There is a Hardees on the left. Continue north 1.7 miles to the 2nd stop light, intersection of Industrial Dr. Turn left.

From Industrial Dr. go .01 mile, turn left onto Enterprise. This road stops after .03 mile at the County Hwy. Dept. gate. Turn right on unmarked gravel road, Future Ln. Go .03 mile and look for the giant rooster on the left. You have made it.
