

Editor's Ramblings ~ Grinder Workshop

I hope everyone's New Year is starting off well. Besides the cold so far, I think 2018 is going to be a great year. We have lots planned for this year. To start off, the grinder workshop that I have been working on. Here are some details that may help for those who are interested in the workshop.

I have also sent emails to those who were interested in the workshop and who provided me with an email address. There will be two workshops and I will use the responses from this newsletter and the email I sent to see who all is still interested I will split everyone between the 2 workshop dates based on the order you first contacted me. However, your spot will not be held unless payment has been made. I need to have payment on or before the March meeting in order to get all the parts ordered for the workshops. Currently if everyone on my list is still interested I have one more spot open. I have the dates set as April 14th and 15th and 21st and 22nd.

Email is my preferred way of sending updates for the workshops. Unfortunately, between work and poor cellular service at home I don't spend a lot of time on the phone. I do try to return voicemails so if you call, please leave a voice mail, my cel service is not great at home. You can contact me at: 636-359-1246 or vie email at BAMeditor2015@gmail.com.

I still need to get prices on some various hardware and supplies yet but I have the major items priced. I decided to offer 2 options in the power system, both are variable speed. The biggest difference will be whether or not you want to run on 110V or 220V. I wanted to offer this option as a reduced cost option if anyone needed the extra cost savings. While the motors are about the same cost the variable frequency drive (freq drive) is considerably cheaper for a 1HP motor. This will however limit the power output of the grinder, the frequency drives are Nema 4x rated meaning they are sealed and can resist at least 65 GPM of water from a 1" nozzle at 10ft. making the safe for both wet grinding as well as safe from grinder dust, the X denotes additional corrosion resistance. The frequency drive I used in my build was a bit less costly but was not dust or water rated so I had to go to great pains to enclose it away from dust. This however will allow for the mounting of the frequency drive up by the motor where we will have easy access to the tracking assembly.

motor functions and controls.

There could be a 3rd option if no one is interested in the 1HP version although the cost would be the same as the 2HP version. A 1.5HP motor on the 2HP speed controller would allow for 110V use, this would not reduce the build cost but would allow for easy hook up if you don't have 220V available with minimal loss of power.

I am going with glass filled nylon pulley sets that will consist of four pulleys; three idler pulleys: two at 2" dia and one at 3" dia and one drive pulley at 5" dia. These pulleys will be lighter than all aluminum pulleys and are the same material that you car engines idler pulley is made from. The reduced weight will allow more power to go to grinding rather than turning wheels. I will be getting the platens cut to match mine which will allow for easily adding a 4" and 6" contact wheel in place of top and bottom wheels respectively. I will let everyone add the contact wheels of there choice, there are just too many options. I am also leaving out the plug on the grinders, again there are so many options available that I will let everyone add what ever style matches the outlets in their shop. I will have a couple on hand so we can turn on each grinder for testing.

I will be getting the steel tube delivered to my work and my plant manager has said I can use the shop saw to get the tubing cut to lengths, so I will have that done.

So far the total price looks to be: \$950 for the 2HP \$930 for the 1.5 HP and \$775 for the 1HP

So far everyone that has gotten back with me is interested in the 2HP version or the 1.5HP version.

As far as the build goes. We will need to have people set up on several different jobs at once: we will need people at the drill presses drilling holes, we will need at least 3 competent welders. I have a full sized and 2 110 V welders that will be on hand to do the welding. We will need a couple people to wire up the motors and freq drives. as well as a few people doing the scarfing of weld seams and the fabrication of the

Lastly, please make sure everyone brings along safety glasses wear appropriate shoes and clothing. we will be cutting, grinding and welding so no nylon or polyester clothing and preferably wear some boots. I will try to have lunch available on all needed days of the workshop.

I would like to do this the same way we did the power hammer workshop I helped on a few years back. once all the work is done every grinder will get numbered and we will each draw a number from a hat to take one home. I realize we will have different motor options, I will plan accordingly once I know what everyone wants as far as options.

If you are still interested, which option you would prefer? What parts of the build you would be best at or most interested in doing? Let me know if you have a preference of dates.




















Headache Hammer In @ Pat McCarty's

Most of time it's hard for me to find the words to start writing about Pat's Headache Hammer-In. This year only one word comes to mind –

CCCCOOOLLLLDDDD. The high temperature outside of Pat's shop never got above 5°. Thanks to Pat's early morning heroics to get the box stove lit up, the inside temperature was much more palatable, somewhere close to 32°. I only say that because I didn't see any frozen water in the shop. Never-the-less, the masses started arriving by 8:30 or 9:00AM and soon the inside temperature was more like the normal Headache Hammer-In temperatures. There was not many who spent much time looking over Pat's tailgate pile.

The project this year, as in many years, was Valentines Day related. The main project was a medallion with a heart embossed on it, and a hole punched in it to hang it up. I didn't see Pat make the first one, but if you look at Figure 1 you can probably guess how it was made. The disc were about 3/16" thick by 2" diameter. He had made a couple of "heart" punches to use, Figure 2, and also had a number of texturing hammers to decorate the surface. Most of the projects I saw being made used a "pick" type hammer to get the texture. Although not done as a project for everyone, Pat made a couple of heart impressions in two pieces of wrought iron, Figure 3, and mentioned the fissures around the edge are typical of forging wrought iron, especially if you don't keep it hot enough. I only saw about 6 or 8 people making the project this year, but I think the allure of the box stove heat had something to do with that.

Pat also made a leaf using his normal techniques, but this time it was made of bronze. It was very hard to work, even for Pat. See Figure 4. I had previously seen a silver leaf Pat had made using 925 silver, which was also difficult to work with. I guess Pat had gotten bored with making leaves, he must have make at least a thousand of them, that he wanted the challenge of using a new material.





It may be that the less formal gatherings are also a little less intimidating to new blacksmiths. The local hammer-ins don't have to be as large as Pat and Bernie's. A group of 5 or 6 people could be just as welcoming to new blacksmiths. Corbin Newcomb has conducted a hammer-in for wanna-be knife makers for many years. Although his shop was fairly small compared to Pat and Bernie's, each year I would see at least four or five young folks forging their first knife, and I can't tell you how many young folks he helped get started over the years.

Meeting Minutes ~ January Meeting

President Steve McCarthy opened the meeting by thanking Dale Kirby for hosting the meeting. Dale in turn thanked the demonstrators, Mike McLaughlin and Ken Jansen. Steve also thanked them.

Bruce gave the financial report and mentioned the expenses were higher than usual due the insurance premiums being paid. The membership in general agreed the insurance BAM carries is a hood value. Bruce Herzog provided some words of caution when towing any of the BAM trailers: make sure the tire pressure is what it is supposed to be. His experience in the tire business taught him that most of the towing problems result from under-inflated tires. He also reported that BAM now has 625 members, up 4 from the previous count.

Steve McCarthy mentioned that ABANA asked to borrow the MTS trailer at the end of June. A motion was made, and seconded to allow them to use it, followed by approval of membership. Ken Jansen will deliver it to them in Virginia.

Steve reminded everyone the scholarship option ballots are due back to him by February 15th. They were included in the Nov-Dec issue of the BAM newsletter. Apparently the printed name and signature lines were missing from newsletter version. Steve recommended printing your name and signing anywhere on the ballot. Bernie has made a copy of the ballot to all patrons of Around-The-Anvil. Be sure to circle the one option you are voting for. Matthew Burnett asked if we could provide a list of all recipients of BAM scholarships and who has and has not repaid their commitment. There is a list of all recipients but not of the payback status. Matthew also asked about the age restriction BAM has on the scholarships. It seems that BAM insurance and/or the school where the applicant would be studying, is the driving force for the age restriction. Bruce Herzog is going to check with the insurance folks.

Due to Don Birdsall's heath issues Phil Harber will take the MTS trailer to Ray Scott's class in Eminence and then get it to the BAM conference. Mathias Penn will teach the class at the conference. Transportation from the conference is still TBD.

Steve mentioned that a demonstrator has been requested for the Jefferson County Fairgrounds in Hillsboro, MO on Oct 6th. Contact Steve if can volunteer.

Last years demonstrator, Nathan Roberson, at Hank Knickmeyer's BAM meeting was paid for through the Preston Williams and Doug Hendricks memorial funds, and Steve McCarthy is looking for suggestions for more demonstrations.

Michael Gorzel, the BAM Conference Chairman, gave a conference report, listing the primary demonstrators and asking if anyone had any ideas for additional family programs, such as stained glass classes etc.. If you have a suggestion contact Michael at 636-447-4309 or mo.blacksmith.conference@gmail.com. Also check the BAM webpage for ongoing updates. The demonstrator equipment requirements previously listed on Around-The-Anvil have all been covered. The knifemaker demonstrator is shipping his equipment, and is flying to either Kansas City or St. Louis and needs someone to transport him to the conference. If you can help, contact Michael as previously listed. John Sherwood reminded everyone about the importance of displaying items at the conference gallery. This where you get to show off your skills as a blacksmith and possibly inspire someone else to make something. Kent Harbit reminded all volunteers, who get conference registration fees waived, except for meals and classes, still need to complete the registration form and send it him so we have an accurate count on how many attend the conference. Bernie Tappel is going to list the tool box raffle needs on the BAM webpage. If you want to donate items that are blacksmith related but not on the list, let Bernie know what you are donating. His contact information is on the BAM webpage. If you have any large items for the auction or iron-in-the-hat they contact Michael Gorzel so they can advertised appropriately. Michael also said again that he had block of rooms allocated to BAM at the Comfort Inn, but due to all the other activity in Sedalia that weekend he couldn't get a lot of rooms.

Mike McLaughlin said he was bringing the Key Ring Tree that he made last year for people to hang key rings on. The tree or maybe all the key rings will be auctioned again this year. Sounds like the start of a neat tradition. I don't know how many key rings it can hold, but I'm sure everyone at the conference could make one and hang it on there.

Matthew Burnett suggested we all be midful of all the volunteers it takes to make the conference successful. Steve adjourned the meeting.
