## President Report

At the June meeting at Ned at Ester Digh's it was voted that we should go ahead and replace the little white trailer that the forges, anvils and other conference equipment are stored in. The new trailer is a 7x14 tandem axel with a ramp door. It is gray in color but otherwise just like the MTS trailer. If you have ever helped load or unload the old trailer at conference or the State Fair, you know how much of a blessing this will be. Kent Harbit has the trailer now. Sometime after the Fair the equipment will be switched to the new trailer. After that happens, we will need to decide how to get rid of the old one. I think sealed bids may be the way to go, but we have plenty of time to discuss it.

Also at the June meeting was a discussion of a large anvil that BAM purchased around 2006. After some research and a few phone calls by Bruce Herzog and myself, mystery solved. BAM owns a 450lb double horned Habermann anvil. It has been stored in a corner of John Murray's shop since the last Warrenton conference. Now that it has been rediscovered, we need to decide what to do with it. We need another anvil for the conference trailer, and this was originally purchased for a demonstrator's anvil. Although it is a very nice anvil, it's size is what caused it to get put in storage in the first place. Moving a 450lb anvil in and out of the trailer safely is not an easy task. We

need to either come up with a solution for set up and storage or sell it and get something more manageable. We will discuss it at the September meeting.

The July meeting was quite an experience for me. It was the first meeting Lori and I have hosted and the first time I have forged in front of more than a couple people. I really appreciate the turn out we had. I never got an exact count but I know it was over 80. Now a large meeting is good, but when it is also the demonstrator's first public demonstration it can also be a little intimidating. To say the least, I was just a little nerved up. As with most demos there are a few things that don't go as planned. I didn't have too many problems except for when I let my tongs get too hot and about a ½" o f one side broke off and went straight for Bob Stormer's bare leg. Well, the hot metal didn't quite make it to Bob's leg and I was able to fix the tongs fairly quick, so it worked itself out ok. The ax I made required some work at the grinder so I wasn't able to finish it at the meeting but will have it in the iron in the hat at the September meeting. I also appreciate that everyone cleaned up after themselves so well. Nothing was out of place and all the trash was in the cans. The only thing I had to do when everyone was put the chairs away. Thank you all.

## Meeting Minutes ~ June Meeting

President Steve McCarthy opened the meeting and was thanked by all the attendees for hosting the meeting and demonstrating.

Bruce Herzog gave a detailed treasurers report and noted that BAM now has 615 members, which is down 34 members from the previous meeting. Bruce commented that this is not unusual for this time of year.

Mike McLaughlin gave a scholarship report, but since nobody has requested a scholarship, there wasn't much to report. The scholarship program is an excellent way to improve your forging and finishing skills. Call Mike to request a scholarship.

Steve McCarthy had the new conference equipment trailer with the BAM logo at the meeting. Kent Harbit will take it back to his shop and begin the process of transferring the equipment from the old trailer to the new one. The transfer will not be completed by the 2018 State Fair, but will be finished prior to the 2019 Conference. When the old trailer is empty it will be auctioned by sealed bids with a minimum of \$400. Kent also has tickets and parking passes for anyone who has signed up to work at the State Fair. If you want to help at the state fair call Kent at 660-647-2349. You get free fair entrance and really good parking.

Willie Bagley has requested use of the BAM MTS trailer for conducting a boy scout blacksmithing class. Concern was expressed about whether the Boy Scouts had sufficient insurance. Steve McCarthy will check with Willie to make sure he understands the insurance is the responsibility of the Boy Scouts.

Steve McCarthy addressed the issue of the missing BAM anvil that was briefly discussed at the June meeting. Bruce Herzog did some extensive investigation and could not determine what happened to it. He thought that maybe Stan Winkler had bought it from BAM and was going to check his financial records for evidence of a canceled check.

Karen Bouckaert, the BAM Librarian, said there has been a change in the rules for borrowing books from the library. Now you need to return the book at the "second" meeting from when you signed it out, rather than the first. You get an extra two months to keep it.

Karen also is asking for suggestions of a new vendor for the BAM conference T-shirts. If you know someone who might do the imprinting contact Karen at 636-673-1996. She typically orders about 250 t-shirts for the conference.

Don Anders mentioned that some of the forges in the MTS trailer have some of the insulation is coming loose.

Matthew Burnett talked about keeping the BAM demonstrator list up to date. The list is on the BAM webpage and Bernie Tappel asked that you contact him if you want to be added to, or taken off the list. You can contact him at 573-496-3793.



I was contacted by Jim Blaho from Artisan Ideas to review a new book they had just come out with. I took me a while to write this review. The book titled *The Blacksmiths Project Book* Is written by Antonello Rizzo who also wrote *Secrets of the Forge*. I really enjoyed reading this, for me I was able to read it from cover to cover, however it is just as easily used as a reference guide to make any of the included projects.

It has a total of 21 projects that range through several styles of smithing as well as finishes to make your work have that hint of color you may be looking for. Each project comes from a different smith, all of which produced amazing work. While many of the projects are what I would call Sculpture or Art Projects, there are plenty of great useable projects and tools as well. For me no blacksmithing project book

## Bernie Tappel's Old Retired Guys

& Anybody Who Wants to Take a Vacation Day Hammer-In, July 26, 2018

First of all, I want to thank Bernie and Patti Tappel for opening their house and shop to about 76 people for the day, and especially for letting our three granddaughters use their driveway for chalk art. Secondly, Bernie asked me to pass along a big thank you to all the people who helped with the food preparation and serving, those who helped demonstrate in the shop, and those who helped the less experienced smiths get started on their projects. It was a wonderful mix of very talented blacksmiths and those who are willing to learn from them. The weather was as good as it could be for late July in Missouri. A little rain in the afternoon, but that helped cool things down a bit. There are a lot of pictures posted in BAM Gallery on Facebook, and a few of them are included with this article. If you have the chance to review the pictures in the BAM Gallery, you'll see a lot of groups of people visiting, which I think is critical part of any of the BAM meetings. A few that we don't get to see often are Don & Joyce Nichols, Maurice & Bess Ellis, and Hank and Bonita Knickmeyer.

I didn't get there early enough to see Bernie start off with a demonstration of how he makes tongs using some tools and fixtures he made for his Bradley hammer (Figure 1). He repeated the demonstration in the afternoon which is covered later in this article. Bernie was not the only one using the Bradley. Maurice Ellis was using it to make acorn and ball tipped handles with some spring fullers he brought with him. See Figures 2 and 3. I also saw Ian Wille and Pat McCarty using it. I didn't get to see what Ian's project was, but Pat's was a skull he saw made at the ABANA conference (see Figure 4). Ken Jansen made a square frame with real "square" inside and outside corners. I think he saw this at ABANA. I didn't get a picture of the finished product, but Figure 4a shows the work-inprogress. I think the inside corners were finished and Ken was working on the outside corners.

There was no shortage of forge space outside either. Bernie, with Patti's help I'm sure, built an overhang on the back of his shop that ran the entire length of the shop. Figure 5 shows some of the activity outside. There were four coal forge stations and one gas forge station. Counting the primary forge inside, there were six forge stations that were kept busy all day. I could

not keep track of all the projects. When the afternoon rains came, it had no impact on forging activity. What a terrific and timely addition to the shop.

What would a blacksmith meeting be without food? Figure 6 shows part of the kitchen committee. Mike Gentzsch made the cowboy beans in a dutch oven outside the shop, Figure 6a. The food was terrific, lots of desserts, and the rain held off long enough for most of us sitting outside to finish. However, the group photo that was planned for after lunch was rained out. This year Bernie donated a pair of box jaw tongs, and a pair of bolt tongs as attendance prizes. The drawings for the prizes were made at the end of lunch. Willie Bagley won the box jaw tongs and his grand-daughter Yoo Jung won the bolt tongs. They are both pictured in Figure 7 making a chain link.

After lunch, Bernie demonstrated making tongs again for those of us who didn't see it in the morning. Figures 8 thru 14 show the sequence for making the tongs. For these tongs I think Bernie said he uses 1/2" round stock, but for box jaw tongs he uses 5/8" square stock. Figure 8 shows Bernie shaping the jaws for the tongs using the Bradley, with Figure 9 showing the resulting forged parts. Figure 10 shows the tools Bernie made to put the final shape on the jaws of the tongs. The tool on the left is used to shape the "bow" in the jaws and the one on the right is used to put a groove in the end of the jaws. Figure 11 is the jig he made to fit on the lower die of the Bradley that holds the jaws while the hand held tools shown in Figure 10 are used to finish the jaws. Figure 12 shows the "bow" being shaped while Figure 13 shows the finished bow shape and the groove being forged in the end of the jaws. The tongs are ready for a rivet in Figure 14.

Although Bernie's hammer-in might no longer be called a small, local hammer-in any more, I will repeat that I believe the future of blacksmithing, and BAM specifically, relies on small groups of people getting together to provide access to blacksmithing for those who have trouble traveling to the larger meetings, or just prefer smaller groups. 


