

Meeting Minutes ~ January Meeting

President Steve McCarthy opened the meeting by thanking Dale Kirby for hosting the meeting and providing lunch. He also thanked Pat McCarty for being the demonstrator. He then reminded everyone that the contact information that Bruce Herzog has, and is listed in the roster that was just distributed with the Nov-Dec issue of the BAM newsletter, needs to be correct. When Bernie tried to send emails to notify members about the postponed meetings in January he had about 20% identified as undeliverable. Please check your listed email and phone number and update them when you renew your membership, or contact Bruce now at 314-892-4690 or biherzog@charter.net. Bruce gave the financial and membership reports. BAM membership is now at 635, up 10 from the last meeting.

Steve revisited the idea of moving the regular BAM meeting to even numbered months, instead of the current odd number months, to help relieve the meeting/conference overlap in May June and July. After a brief discussion, a motion was made and passed to move the 2020 meetings to Feb, Apr, June, Aug, Oct, and Dec on a trial basis.

Michael Gorzel mentioned that the 2019 Conference plans are almost complete. Jymm Hoffman is the traditional demonstrator, and Raymond Rybar is the knifemaker demonstrator. The family events will include the traditional basket class and the stained-glass class, and there is a price break for early registration. The Conference flyer will be available on the BAM webpage soon. The group project is still undetermined, and Michael is looking for a 50 LB power hammer for use by the knifemaker. He also mentioned that he needs welder and Don Anders offered to donate a Lincoln AC welder to BAM.

Michael is looking for a co-chair for next year's BAM conference so he can have someone ready to take over when his time as chairman is over. The conference committee is doing more advertising this year to improve attendance.

Steve McCarthy is looking for a replacement for Bernie Tappel as 2nd Vice-President of BAM. If you would like to volunteer contact Nominating Committee members Mike Gentzsch at 573-881-6408, or Chris Miller at 573-996-4931. Bernie will continue as the BAM webpage manager.

Use of color printing for the BAM newsletter was revisited as planned for the January 2019 meeting. A motion was made and passed to continue with 8 color pages in the BAM newsletter.

Don Birdsall is resigning from MTS Coordinator due to health issues, and Steve is looking for a replacement for Don. The new coordinator is NOT responsible for all training associated with the MTS program, but is responsible for keeping the trailer in a ready state when it is needed for MTS classes. If you would like to volunteer please contact Steve McCarthy at 417-260-1861. It was not clear at the meeting whether the normal Ray Scott spring training session is still planned. It also looks like the trailer can remain at Ken Jansen's shop for the foreseeable future.

ABANA sent an email to all affiliates asking who would be interested in helping host the 2022 Conference. If we agreed to host, BAM would be responsible for setup, which is mostly done by Pat McCarty anyway, and it's not sure if registration would be part of our responsibility. Jon McCarty will try to get more specifics about what BAM would need to do, before we volunteer to do it.

The previously missing large BAM anvil was located at John Murray's shop, and is now up for sale. It is a Habermann (200 k) 440 lbs. and has a side shelf. A photo of the anvil is on the BAM webpage in "BAM Tailgate" section. The price is \$3000 and it is located in New Melle, MO at John's shop. The money from the sale will likely go toward buying more equipment for the BAM conference knifemaker station.

Mark Lawson asked everyone to bring their touch mark to the conference so he can stamp some aluminum with all BAM members touch marks. Bruce Herzog also asked that everyone bring pre-stamped piece of steel that he can photograph to make a BAM touch mark collage.

The meeting was adjourned.



Headache Hammer In @ Pat McCarty's

'Twas the night before New Year's, when all through the shop, the wood stove was cool and nary a forge was hot; the tongs and hammers were hung by the forge with care, in hopes that tomorrow the crowd would be there; Pat was checking his steel with thoughts of the project that soon would be real; and MaryJo in her kitchen, Pozole recipe in mind, checking her cabinets for ingredients for all the right kind.

When out in the forge there arose such a clatter, MaryJo ran from the house to see what was the matter.

When what to her wondering eyes did appear, Pat with a double heart hanger that tomorrow he could share.

He was dressed in his apron and gloves, from his head to his foot, And his clothes were all covered with coal dust and soot; a bundle of coal he had flung on his back, so tomorrow he could share the forge in the back.

He spoke not a word, but went straight to his work, And measured all the stock; then cut the slit for the fork, MaryJo heard him exclaim, as he closed the shop door and rubbed his chin, "Tomorrow we'll have the 2019 headache hammer-in!"

I think my articles for Pat's hammer-in started in 2005, missing one year that Bernie Tappel covered for me, so I thought I would try something new for the opening paragraph. Pat did the usual stellar job of cleaning the shop and rearranging things so lots of people can work, visit, eat, and just wander around. MaryJo, as usual, provided what some of us consider the most important part of the gathering; food. She provided Pozole, potato soup, corn bread, and other fixins' assisted by family members and friends. Others, including Bob Mepham, and Bernie and Patti Tappel brought some supporting vittles, such as pealn-eat shrimp, and Krumkake/NewYears Cookies, respectively. Sorry if I missed items others provided. If you are fortunate enough to attend next year, I suggest you plan on starting New Year's resolutions regarding food on Jan 2nd.

Pat had a "Count The Snakes" contest. He places some of his forged snakes around the shop and asked everyone to determine how many there are. If you know anything about Pat's shop, you know it could be very hard to find snakes among all the other treasures. Figure 1 shows the prizes for the ones who get the closest to the real number. This year there are two first place winners: Cade Steinborn and Alex Tappel. 2nd place goes to Dan Wedemeyer, and third place goes to Gavin (no last name on the ticket).

Pat's project this year followed his normal pattern of making something for Valentine's Day gifts. It's a double heart with a hanger at the bottom. You obviously could make the hanger portion any way you want. Pat provided written instructions that are shown in Figure 2, which also shows a couple of his examples. I didn't arrive early enough to watch Pat do the introduction demo, but I did get a sequence of photos while Bernie Tappel made one toward the end of the day. In case you're having trouble reading the instructions in Figure 1, he started with 1/4" by3/4" flat stock. I think it was about 8" long, but the length only affects what you do with the hook portion. I also think Pat provided the slit that went 4 ½" down from one end. The next step is to draw the two arms formed by the slit to rounded points that are the same length. Then bend each of them back 3" from the bottom of the slit. Open the remainder of the slit and round each side to a point. Leave these rounded sections larger than the first ones were so the points of the bottom heart don't get too thin. The next step is to use scrolling pliers to shape the larger heart, followed by the smaller heart. The accuracy of how equal the length of the arms were in both drawing and rounding procedures will determine how symmetrical your hearts are. The only remaining steps are to shape a hanger and punch the hole to mount it. Figures 3 through 11 show Bernie's efforts. In Figure 5 you'll see two soapstone marks. The mark on the two forks marks the 3" dimension from the tips where the forks are to be bent back, and the other marks where to position the piece in the vise after re-heating the forks so they can be bent. The 3" mark will get burned off when reheating, so the second mark lines up with the other side of the vise.. Figure 6 shows how the second mark lines with the vise to bend the forks at the right length.

This year, as in past years, I think there were equal parts of visiting, reminiscing, and forging going on in the shop. What a wonderful way to start the New Year! Thanks Pat, MaryJo, and the whole McCarty family.

Bone Curing for Handles

About thirteen years ago i started making my own knives and developed this way of curing bones, so far all bones I've treated this way look the same way they did the day i finished them and take on an antique yellow appearance. I've been visiting your site for some time and have made good use of a lot of the information here and would like to contribute my own piece.

First prep the bones by cutting them to the rough length needed; this should be done as soon as possible or the bones will get a brown discoloration in places.

Then place the bones in a pot of water and cover with about 2" of water. Add 1Tbs of salt and a drop of dish soap. Bring to a rolling boil, reduce heat and let simmer for 3-5 minutes. This removes the animal fats and cooks the marrow to ease removal of it.

At the same time heat enough vegetable oil to cover the bones in a separate pot until just hot enough water bubbles when dripped in.

Place bones directly from the simmering water into the heated oil. Remove from heat and allow to sit overnight.

Dry bones on a piece of cloth for a few days. They can then be sanded and coated with stock oil if wanted.

Hope this is helpful to someone down the line.



Coal Specifics

A few notes on our coal:

- 1) Not all coal is created equal. The coal we buy is fro the West Virginia to Pennsylvania vein and is a high metallurgy grade unlike coal from other areas.
- 2) Raw coal from the bagging company is stored outside which allows it to get rained on, (rain is water which weighs 8.4 pounds to the gallon). If the coal is bagged wet and then dries out the weight will change.
- 3) The coal fines which when mixed with water to form a paste burns along with the chunks of coal but during shipping and handling may sift out of the bags causing a weight loss.

So, the bottom line to all of this is we are selling coal in approximately 50 pounds bags.
