Meeting Minutes ~ November Meeting

Vice-President Kent Harbit filled in for President Steve McCarthy and opened the meeting by thanking Mark Lawson for hosting the meeting and doing part of the demonstration followed by Mike McLaughlin as the other demonstrator. Kent also mentioned that we'll need someone to volunteer to be president of BAM starting at the 2020 conference, since Steve will be retiring. Kent also touched briefly on the status of the ABANA 2021 Conference BAM was considering hosting. New information suggests that ABANA was expecting us to have a committee setup to handle the planning and budgeting. Since we originally expected to only provide volunteers, and not be responsible for the organization and budgeting, we don't have a committee, which will likely remove us from consideration to host the conference. John Sherwood did some research found the attendance cost was \$295 per person plus \$75 for a spouse for the 2020 ABANA Conference. I later found these are the ABANA member prices with early registration, and go to \$415 and \$120 respectively for non-member late registration.

Bruce Herzog gave the financial report and membership status. We had a net decrease of 18 members since the last meeting, resulting in 592 members. This is the first time in quite awhile that we've been below the 600-membership mark.

Mike McLaughlin presented a BAM scholarship report by saying that there is money available for scholarships. Mike is also looking for someone to replace him at Shoal Creek Living History Museum in Liberty, MO where he volunteers as a demonstrator/teacher. It helps if you are good with kids. Fred Arnhold asked a question about BAM expenses, and Bruce provided some general information, including that the newsletter cost is roughly equal to the income from membership dues. Most of the income is from the various iron-in-the-hat events, the BAM boutique, conference auction and raffle, and a little from selling coal. Insurance accounts for about \$1000 per year. Patti Tappel mentioned that she sold about \$600 worth of BAM merchandise at the SOFA conference.

A question also came up if we had a way to track whether people who participate in the MTS training become long term BAM members. The short answer was no. As part of that suggestion someone suggested

that we might want follow up with MTS participants with questionnaires about how we could make it better.

Bob Stormer made BAM business cards available if anyone needed them for up-coming events.

The BAM meeting was adjourned.



Iron and Wood Equals Happiness

So here is the backstory to a fancy walnut chest. A good friend of mine one day, "Do you still do woodwork?" I said of course, even though, I am still recovering from major heart surgery. He said, "My dad had some old walnut lumber for over thirty years and he never made anything with it, so he gave it to me. I've had it for twenty years and I've never made anything with it. If I give it to you, will you make something with it?" I said "sure," and off I went.

My cousin, Steve Robinett, (also a BAM member) helped me plane it, joint it, saw it, miter it, and assemble the basic box. It's harder than you think to make a truly squared box. I took it from his shop (really nice) to mine (really marginal), sawed off the top, installed the piano hinge and ready for some metal. I wanted to incorporate some blacksmith elements into the box so I made some corner plates, designed a star pattern for the top and repousse and inlaid it. I added a red glass cover in the center of the start (there's a reason). My artist buddy Mark Sampsol, (also a BAM member) says "why don't you make the hasp in the shape of a peach." (see pic)...

The fleur de li was added as a family touch. The handles are made springs over heave gauge wire, or small rod. The wood corners are hard maple sawed and chiseled to fit. As I was chiseling and fitting each joint I was mumbling to myself.... "what the blank were you thinking?" IF IT'S NOT HARD IT'S NOT WORTH DOING! Oh by the way, due to Mark's prompting, there are five secret compartments incorporated into the box. Makes a hard project nearly impossible. Footnote... All the metal accessories were made from junk (assets) lying on the floor or pile. Sound familiar?

Try it and have fun fellow blacksmiths.





Coal Specifics

A few notes on our coal:

- 1)Not all coal is created equal. The coal we buy is fro the West Virginia to Pennsylvania vein and is a high metallurgy grade unlike coal from other areas.
- 2) Raw coal from the bagging company is stored outside which allows it to get rained on, (rain is water which weighs 8.4 pounds to the gallon). If the coal is bagged wet and then dries out the weight will change.
- 3) The coal fines which when mixed with water to form a paste burns along with the chunks of coal but during shipping and handling may sift out of the bags causing a weight loss.

So, the bottom line to all of this is we are selling coal in approximately 50 pounds bags.
